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




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



Percentage of women is higher among the ECS (39-41%) than among overall participants (33-34%)










Participants and presenters come predominantly from organising country



More women amongst students than regular attendees.


BUT big variations between conferences

Presentation length and questions

Keynote (35 min) + long presentation (15 min): on time Short presentation (7 min): too long (10 min)

2 to 3 questions for short and long presentations, 5 questions for keynote

26% questions from women (women attendance 34%)8% questions from students (student attendance 27%)

23% friendly questions (45% from women, 14% from students) Short = 5% friendly, long = 24% friendly, keynote = 80% friendly







Recommendations

Vary the conference location

Provide student travelling grants

Invite diverse keynote speakers & Select diverse session chairs

Ask for participants data. Gender, requirements or disabilities, country of origin or socio-economic background

Present diversity data

Encourage a supportive and friendly environment

Instruct session chairs to select in priority women and students to ask questions

Grant awards to diverse students







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
